If you see a pet in distress, call the Jerome PD at 928-634-8992. If the animal needs medical assistance, the police will contact us.



Follow "The Hot Cars Act" recently introduced in the House of Representatives by Tim Ryan (D-OH) and Jan Schakowsky (D-IL), which requires car manufacturers to add a sensing device that will sound an alert when someone (or a pet) is left in the vehicle. Contact your senators and urge them to support this bill.



**PROTECT THOSE PAWS.** Summer sidewalks are sizzling. To avoid injury from hot surfaces:

- \* Walk when it's cool or stick to the grass. If you feel the heat, so will your companions.
- \* Use paw wax or moisturizers. You can find plenty of great, pet-safe recipes online.
- \* If your pet will put up with it, try shoes, socks, or peel-and-stick pad protectors.

Check pads carefully, especially if there's a chance they've gotten burned. Pets will show you by limping and chewing or licking their feet—or they will avoid going for a walk. Paw pads may appear redder or darker than usual, blistered, or otherwise damaged.

**THE PARADE IS ON!** The annual Fourth of July Parade is on for Sunday morning, July 4. We will meet at the fire station at 9:30 a.m. and begin the parade around 10:30 a.m. Please be there no later than 10:00. If you are interested in being in the parade, please contact Chief Blair. All are welcome to participate in the parade or wave from the streets! The JFD hopes everyone has a great and safe holiday.

**Fire danger is extreme.** Please be extra cautious of possible fire activities. Create a defensible space of 30 feet around your home. The devastating Cornville fire that started on June 13 spread over 1000 acres in about three hours. If any resident needs help from our fuel abatement crew, pick up Firewise applications at the fire station or town hall.



**Jerome is in Stage 3 (and Stage 2) fire restrictions.** This essentially means Stage 2 fire restrictions are in still in effect, plus the Prescott National Forest is closed until further notice.

FIREWORKS ARE PROHIBITED IN JEROME AT ALL TIMES! This means sparklers too! This is per town code section 10-2-2.

**Ready, Set, Go!** is a nationwide program that educates residents about proactive measures to take before an emergency and actions to follow when communities are threatened. The three steps encourage citizens to get READY by preparing now for what threatens their community, be SET by maintaining awareness of significant danger and to GO, evacuate immediately when the danger is current and life-threatening.

READY - Prepare Now: Be aware of the hazards that can threaten your community.

- Take steps now to prepare for seasonal threats.
- Register with your county/tribal emergency notification system.
- Connect with your local emergency management office, sheriff's office, and public health department on social media.
- Make a family evacuation and communication plan that includes family phone numbers, out-of-town contacts, and family meeting locations.
- Build an emergency go kit with enough food, water, and necessary supplies for at least 72 hours. Include items to help keep you and your family healthy, such as face coverings, hand sanitizer, and sanitizing wipes. Start with the five P's: people and pet supplies, prescriptions, papers, personal needs, and priceless items (see page 4 for more info).
- Check with your neighbors, family, friends, and elders through video chats or phone calls to ensure they are READY.
- Keep up to date on local news, weather watches, weather warnings, and public health recommendations.

#### SET - Be Alert: Know there is significant danger in your area.

- Residents should consider voluntarily relocating to a shelter or with family/friends outside the affected area. Residents should avoid close contact with those who are sick and should practice public health recommendations when relocating.
- Grab your emergency go kit.
- Keep in mind unique needs for your family or special equipment for pets and livestock.
- Stay aware of the latest news and information from public safety and public health officials.

This might be the only notice you receive. Emergency services cannot guarantee they will be able to notify everyone if conditions rapidly deteriorate. Be SET to GO.

#### GO! - Evacuate: Danger in your area is imminent and life threatening.

- Residents should evacuate immediately to a shelter or with family/friends outside of the affected area. Residents should avoid close contact with those who are sick and should practice public health recommendations when relocating.
- If you choose to ignore this advisement, you must understand emergency services may not be able to assist you further.
- Follow instructions from emergency personnel, stay on designated evacuation routes, and avoid closed areas.

#### 5 P's of Evacuation

People and Pets and other animals/livestock and supplies.

**Prescriptions** with dosages, medicines, medical equipment, vision and hearing aids, batteries and power cords, face coverings, hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes.

**Papers** including important documents (hard copies and/or electronic copies saved on external hard drives or thumb drives), insurance papers, contacts.

**Personal Needs** including clothing, water, baby supplies, food, cash, credit cards, first aid kits, phones, and chargers. Items for people with access and/or functional needs, such as older adults and children. **Priceless** items including photos, irreplaceable mementos and other valuables.

# STAGE 2 FIRE RESTRICTIONS

#### ARE NOW IN EFFECT IN JEROME





1. Fires, campfires, charcoal, coal and wood stoves (except using a device that is solely fueled by liquid petroleum or LPG fuels that can be turned immediately on and off with no remaining burning material).



**2. Smoking** (except within an enclosed vehicle or building, a developed recreation site, or while stopped in an area at least 3 feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of any flammable material).



3. Operating a chainsaw or other equipment powered by an internal combustion engine from the hours of 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. (except generators with an approved spark-arresting device in an area that is barren or cleared of all overhead and surrounding flammable materials within at least 3 feet of the generator).







5. Discharging a firearm, air rifle, or gas gun, except while engaged in a lawful hunt.



- 6. Using an explosive.
- 7. Using fireworks.

Remember to take a look in the clothes closet while you are at the food pantry. We have a full array of clothing in a variety of sizes, as well as household items, personal items, and decorations.



#### **History From the Jerome Historical Society**



#### Please meet Marie Juanita (Sammie) Dean.

She was born on February 22, 1901, and murdered in Jerome on July 7, 1931, sometime between 8:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

She was divorced from a gambler named George Dean and while in Jerome she worked in the "world's oldest profession." From all accounts, she was very popular. At the

time of her death, she was 30 years, 4 months, and 15 days of age. Sammie was buried in Dallas, Texas, on July 13, 1931.



Thomas Miller was the mayor of Jerome at the time of the murder, and Sammie was dating his son Jack. She was also friendly with Wes Owens Jr., the son of the town's deputy, Wes Owens Sr. Both men were considered suspects at the time, but the crime went unsolved and remains so to this day.

Matt Meierbachtol, Supervisor of Construction and Maintenance in the Verde Valley for Arizona Public Service (APS), recently spoke to Council about fire mitigation. He talked about defensible space around poles (DSAP) to protect against wildfire ignitions. He said customers with public safety concerns around fire can call 602-371-7171, and to keep in mind that APS has a slower response during high fire risk season and will not turn power back on until lines are checked for integrity.
