# IT'S BUDGET TIME. WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO THIS COMING YEAR?

With the generous assistance of the Yavapai Apache Nation, we've just acquired a new twelve/fifteen seat van to run weekend shuttle service to the 300 level, and we're upgrading that by hiring a full-fledged driver and making it a more professional package. Hopefully that will improve the flow of traffic and commerce.

We're putting \$10,000 into a new program of fire suppression, focusing for the moment on town properties. *This will not use chemicals,* but will work at taking down and removing paradise trees and similar problems. We see this as a trial program. Once we work out the kinks we'll expand the work to the outlying neighborhoods. Think of it as landscaping the town. Maybe we can plant some flowers and ivy as we go?

There's going to be a lot of work on School Street. We'll rebuild the regulator by the sluice. That includes fixing the plumbing underground, and then redoing the pavement in that area. While we're at it we'll fix the wall that supports the Civic Center rear parking lot and reopen the stairs that run from Town Hall down to School Street. We even expect to redo the waterline and brickwork around the stairs that follow the sluice between School and Clark. Jerome always was a walking town. We'd like to restore some of that.

**Dwain and his crew want a bobcat**, "the perfect tool for our terrain." We put enough money in the budget to get a good one, but as this article goes to press our current backhoe has developed serious problems and may require major surgery. Getting a new backhoe may trump the bobcat, but we may be able to repair the one and wind up with both. We'll see as the year goes forward.

We do need some heavy equipment, since this year we also intend to install a new septic system in the Lower **Gulch**. For years we've been trying to upgrade the plumbing that handles that whole stretch of the Hogback (from Upper Gulch Road to the Old High School) overlooking Deception Gulch. If you don't know, there are above a dozen homes there that do not connect to the main sewer plant in Bitter Creak; instead they drain down to an area near the old Lozano gas station. We've improved the road down there, inspected the site and now it's time to put in new tanks and leach field.

We've increased the Library budget (modestly) to allow Kathleen to work on her wish list. She's been nickel and dimeing it for a long time; she's clearly learned to be frugal. So we're curious to see how she does. I'm told in her spare time



she's now repairing the broken stained glass in those beautiful copper doors to both the library and Town Hall. That's encouraging. Details do make a difference.

We also put additional money into the Kid's Art Workshop, so look for more fun stuff there.

There's lots more: Finish the leaning wall, the horseshoe pits and the red rock wall across from the Connor; regulator repair and maintenance on Clark Street and the Gulch; deal with the subsidence and the slide area; and all the time keep the organization running smoothly, the infrastructure working, the troops fed and morale good.

So that's what Jerome's new budget is all about. We hope you approve.

#### JEROME PARKING MYTHS VS. ORDINANCES AND STATE LAW

First, please know that when I write any of these newsletter articles, I do not intend them to be taken as a veiled threat of some aggressive future enforcement effort. They are intended primarily for information purposes, to be used by the reader as information to be considered when planning future expansion of existing uses, or the establishment of new uses in Jerome. Back to the topic at hand.....

Since I have been here, I have heard many presumptions and statements about what is allowed and prohibited, as it pertains to parking in our Town.

One of the statements that I have heard is, "So and so is parking in so and so's parking space(s) on the street. Fact: Parking spaces within the public right of way cannot be saved for anyone in particular. It is nice if your neighbors are considerate and do not park in the spot in front of your house or business, however, if another member of the public parks in that space, there is nothing that the Police or anyone else can do about it. Putting out cones or other objects intended to save a space is technically not permitted, and is not enforceable should someone ignore them.

Another complaint I have heard is, "They are parking in a space for too long." Fact: Anyone parking in a parking space located within the public right of way, and that includes our "public" parking lots, can leave their vehicle in a particular parking spot, for up to seventy-two (72) hours, based on State Statutes. The Town *can* regulate specifically how long various parking spots can be used within the public right-of-way, however the signs must be approved by Council, and installed according to State Law requirements as they apply to size, color, height etc. Additionally, such signs are only as effective as our ability to enforce parking standards. It is my personal experience that parking enforcement is one of the most time consuming and friction-creating enforcement efforts I have ever been involved in.

Another statement which I have heard is, "They are not parking in their assigned and approved parking space(s), and park downtown instead." Now it would be really nice if people would park in the spaces which were represented and approved as "designated parking" for a specific business use, however, there is no law which can *force* anyone to *actually* use those parking spaces.

For those property owners or lessors who are fortunate enough to have actual on-site private parking or separate approved parking areas located on private property, you should know that it is up to you to post signs and to enforce any private parking standards which you choose to establish for your parking lot. This includes developing a relationship with a tow company to deal with violators. The Town will not enforce parking regulations on private property. If you are one of the lucky people who own such a parking lot, I recommend that you contact your legal counsel regarding the specific wording and statutory references, which must be stated on private parking signs. In Arizona, such signs are generally required to be 18" by 24", are white with red lettering and do not require Design Review Board approval or sign permits, although they must be reviewed by the Zoning Administrator.

And finally, as an effort to assure that any satellite parking spaces approved for a particular commercial use, or residential use located within a C-1 Use District are "permanent," the TOJ Zoning Ordinance requires that all off-site parking spaces must be described on the title of both the property where the use is taking place, and the property where the parking spaces are located. These recordations then run with the land whenever one or both of the properties are sold, thus guaranteeing that the minimum parking standards are protected. Although in the past there have been occasions where temporary agreements and leased off-site parking spaces have been approved, should the property owner where the parking spaces are located rescind their permission, or if the property is sold, thus eliminating the parking space(s), then the actual business owner or home owner (in C-1) is stuck with having to find new parking alternatives.


Needless to say, and in order to prevent a lot of frustration, you should always verify the existence and legitimacy of any parking spaces associated with any primary use, residential or commercial, prior to selling or buying property within the Town of Jerome.

*Did you know*......that the Bartlett Hotel was once a three story brick structure?

Yep, that "coin toss" area on the corner of Main Street and First Avenue was built in 1901 at a cost of approximately \$65,000. During its heyday, it was the home of a bank, a saloon & billiard room, a liquor store, a men's clothing store, two cafes, the Jerome Mining News printing office, and a drug store, among others, until it was abandoned in the 1940's because the building was deemed too unstable. The Bartlett was sold for salvage after the mine closed in 1953 and the shell of the building was purchased by the Jerome Historical Society in 1956.
